



Abernethy prides itself on strong community spirit

Abernethy lies near the western edge of Highway 22, six km south of Highway 10 and about 30 km east of Fort Qu'Appelle.

The community of 197 is known best for the Motherwell Homestead National Historic Site two km south of the village and also for the Agricultural Society Fair, one of the oldest and most popular town fairs in the province. In 2008 the fair will be celebrating its 102nd anniversary.

The village also has a serviced campground and several businesses, including a grocery store, gas pumps, auto repair, CAA towing service, a restaurant, fertilizer dealer, grain broker, licensed esthetician, fitness center, library, ball diamonds as well as a three-sheet artificial ice curling rink and a skating rink. Two insurance agents and a Credit Union open once a week in the village office.

Service clubs include a very active Seniors Club and the newly formed Abernethy Business and Community Development (ABCD), an organization of business and community people interested in bringing vitality and pride to our community and those who call it home. The village also has a branch of the Royal Canadian Legion and a post office.

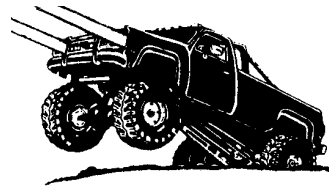
The village boasts the Abernethy Nature Heritage Museum, which is open from May until the end of August each summer. The rest of the year volunteers open the museum by request. Some of the museum's most popular items come from the estate of well-known naturalist Ralph Stuck. Abernethy is also proud to be the original home of the Len Thompson bait factory.

The community also boasts the Pheasant Creek Market which is held every Friday from 3 p.m. 6 p.m. on Main Street from the May long weekend to Labor Day weekend in September.

Although it's one of the smallest communities along Highway 22 in this area, Abernethy prides itself on its strong community spirit. That spirit is especially evident each spring when the Abernethy Community Players host one of the oldest and longest-running dinner theaters in this area.
