



Stockholm is a thriving, active community

Stockholm is a thriving, active community of 323 people located at the intersection of Highways 9 and 22, approximately 16 km north of the Qu'Appelle Valley.

The area was settled in the 1880s mostly by Swedish immigrants, who named the village after the largest city in their homeland and made New Stockholm the largest Swedish Colony in Canada at the time. Later, settlers from Hungary migrated to the area, creating an ethnic mix which is still reflected in the family names and character of the community.

Businesses in the area include an upholstery shop which also specializes in vintage cars, a hardware store with both diesel and gasoline fuel available, a postal outlet, grocery store

and liquor vendor, credit union, cafe, garage, tire shop, insurance agency, hair salon, a hotel and beverage room. Three religious denominations are active in the community.

The community has a modern K-to-9 school and gymnasium and a library which now provides public access to the Internet.

The local Lions Club has built and maintains a three-diamond ball park that continues to attract provincial-class tournaments.

Other facilities include a skating rink and newly refurbished community hall. Ice and figure skating, minor ball, recreation hockey, drama, gymnastics, crafts, music lessons and painting classes are all offered in the village. The local drama club, Sow's Belly Soup Group, presents a very popular annual dinner theatre in March.

Dubuc lies about 20 kilometres north of the Qu'Appelle Valley on Highways 9 and

The village of 55 is named for Sir Joseph Dubuc, a Winnipeg-based traveling judge who was instrumental in bringing settlers to the area. Dubuc was incorporated in 1905, almost two years after the first settlers arrived with the CPR.

Dubuc was the most thriving community on the CPR's Kirkella branch line for many years.

Today Dubuc boasts a hotel and a local farm family operates

a ceramic studio about 12 kilometres southwest of the village. The village also has bus service to Regina.

In addition to a very active senior citizens' group, several other organizations including the Dubuc Recreation Association do much for the community. An ATV derby is usually hosted in April, along with many other events throughout the year.
